

# St. Paul the Apostle Adds New Courses for Adults

The adult education division of St. Paul the Apostle Church is sponsoring two new courses which are now being held for the next five Tuesdays.

The courses, to be held at 8:15 p.m. in the church, are "Changes in the Church and Liturgy as They Apply to the Layman," taught by Brother John P. Mostyn of Bishop Gibbons High School theology department; and "Current Moral Problems—The Christian Approach" by the Rev. Robert Willi, College of St. Rose theology department.

Brother Mostyn attended Iona College where he received his B.A. degree in history. He is a candidate for his masters degree next year from Catholic University. He is treasurer of the newly formed Brothers Conference, Albany Diocese, and is

a member of the Albany Diocese High School Religion Teachers Association.

Father Willi was born in Troy and attended LaSalle Institute in Troy, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, St. Thomas Seminary in Bloomfield, Conn., St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester; Pontifical North American College and Pontifical Gregorian University in Italy. He was ordained a priest in 1963 in Rome.

## Tobin Firm Faces Suit On Pollution

ALBANY (AP) — A 24-year-old student used a 71-year-old law as the basis for a suit against the Tobin Packing Co. yesterday.

Peter Van Schaick, a senior who is majoring in mathematics at the State University here, accused the company of polluting a creek with unlawful discharges.

Van Schaick asked James M. Sullivan Jr., U.S. attorney for the Northern District of New York, to enjoin Tobin from further dumping and to require the company to clean up the creek.

The suit was filed in Federal Court, Van Schaick said he took the action to see whether an 1899 water-pollution law was enforceable.

That statute prohibits the discharge of "any matter of any kind or description whatever" into interstate or intrastate navigable waters of the United States or the tributaries of such waters except with a special permit.
